"Where is the Glögg? Why is there a Pickle?"

Words from your pastor: "Dad," Jessa said. "Let's start a new tradition this year. Let's hang a pickle on the Christmas tree. Whoever finds it on Christmas morning will get \$5.00." These were shocking words to me! "A *new* tradition?" I thought. "Change? Why would we change Christmas?" Isn't the goal of Christmas to repeat last year's

performance or at least out do it? Isn't Christmas all about reliving your childhood or living vicariously through little ones? The pickle was never part of my family's traditions – nor a German tradition if you do you research. I don't know where she got this crazy idea, but I wondered, "Is she just trying to get five bucks from me?"

All families enjoy a variety of traditions during the holiday (holy day) season: English pudding, holiday crackers (firecrackers), candles, evergreens, wreaths, yule logs, etc. These traditions reflect our cultural heritages and our religious values. When traditions are forgotten, or are missing, we may ask: Where is the *glögg* (that Swedish spicy mulled wine with blanched almonds and raisins)? And, what happened to the *pepparkakor* (ginger snaps)? The challenge of each Christmas is finding ways to honor our past as we move into God's future – the coming Kingdom.

I encourage you to ponder anew the ways our many traditions can be researched, reimagined, and renewed to keep the focus on the true meaning of Christmas: Jesus Christ came and he promised to come again. Hang a pickle on the tree, drink some festive eggnog, do whatever helps you remember: the greatest gift of all came on Christmas, Jesus Christ. He will come again!

Our family will bake hundreds of cookies to share with our guests. You do not need to bring cookies or gifts. Come for this joyful time of holiday favorites.





This is a general overview of our church finances through the end of October.

- We are at 83.3% of the budget year.
- For October, our income to date is: \$202,806.61 or 77.21% of our budget. Last month we were at \$182,293.42 or 69.4% of our budget.
- Our expenses to date are: \$217,905.74 or 82.96% of our budget. Last month we were at \$197,847.32 or 75.33% of our budget.
- We have spent \$15,099.13 more than receipts. It was \$15,553.90 more than receipts at the end of September. Comparing the two months, we actually had \$454.77 more in receipts than expenditures during October.
- The checking account at the end of October was \$3,400.25. In early October we paid \$2,500 of our \$7,500 loan from the capital campaign account to assist us with

cash flow. By borrowing from the capital campaign it allows us to not withdraw from our investments at this time. We will need to determine when the remaining \$5,000 is paid either from regular offerings and/or our investments.

- At the all church business meeting the end of October, it was decided to spend an estimated \$16,400 on the much needed roof repairs. The motion approved was that this repair be paid for in two ways:
 - Gifts from individuals who choose to give more than their tithe. This is similar to the way we paid for the carpet in the sanctuary and the van. Anyone can make their gifts over the next six months for the roof repairs.
 - The remainder of the roof repair will be paid out of the capital campaign money market account.

The Baby Closet would like to collect personal care items to give away at






CHRISTIAN EDUCATION COMMITTEE




XYZer's BREAKFAST – Join a group of Seniors who enjoy having fun and making real friendships. The "Extra Years of Zest" small group will meet

JOB - THE BIBLE
BOOK OF THE
MONTH - Job is one of
the wisdom books.
Those books that
draw attention to



dealing with human experience as the arena in which God is present even though we may not be aware of Him at that moment.

Eugene H. Peterson has some interesting things to say about Job. Here are a few of them.

"Job suffered. He asked 'Why?'. He asked 'Why me?' He refused to take silence for an answer. He refused to take clichés for an answer. He refused to let God off the hook . . . Job did not take his suffering quietly or piously" Job went directly to God and "there he protested his suffering, protested mightily."

Is it suffering that troubles us or is it what we see as underserved suffering? Do we sometimes feel we have done the best we can do but as we reach out for the reward we get hit from the blind side?

"Job says boldly what some of us are too timid to say. He makes poetry out of what in many of us is a tangle of confused whimpers. He shouts out to God what a lot of us mutter behind our sleeves. He refuses to take the role of a victim."

Then there are Job's friends. The book of Job is "our primary biblical protest

against religion that has been reduced to explanations or 'answers.' Many of the answers that Job 's so-called friends give him are technically true. But it is the 'technical' part that ruins them. They are answers without personal relationship, intellect without intimacy. . .Job rages against this secularized wisdom that has lost touch with the living realities of God."

We all suffer in life and sometimes it seems unfairly. Do we have the courage of Job to approach God directly and honestly. Sometimes we may be in the role of Job's friends. How do we play that role? What does Job have to say about how we should play this role?

I suggest you read Job in the translation of your choice. Then I suggest, if possible, you read all what Eugene H. Peterson has to say about Job and his friends and His transliteration of Job.
