WHO IS THIS GUY?

Pastor's Corner - **Who is He?** The fourth, fifth, and sixth grade campers and I had a great time trying to answer this question during Heartland Day Camp: **Who is Jesus?** Everyone in the bible had an answer: A miracle worker. A prophet. A superhero back from the dead (i.e., John the Baptist). The kids had their own answers too:

- · A good guy who did great things for people
- A strange, homeless man who lived along time ago
- A miracle worker/magician
- A super hero (boys watching too many cartoons)
- My friend, etc.

Traditionally, people have come to one of three conclusions about Jesus. He was:

- 1. A lunatic (a crazy homeless man ranting insanity)
- 2. A liar (a deceiver who fooled everyone), or
- 3. The Lord (exactly who he said, God in the flesh)

The Gospel readings for worship this summer ask the same question: *Who is he* that controls the waves (Mark 4:35-41)? *Who is he* that heals the sick and raises the dead back to life (Mark 5:21-43)? *Who is he* that feeds the 5,000 and walks on water (Mark 6:30-56 and John 6:1-24)? *Who is he* who claims to be bread from heaven (John 6:24-59)?

The Christian faith asks important questions: Who are we as humans? How should we live and act towards one another? Is there life after dead? Is Jesus unique or is just one among the many spiritual leaders? I invite you to join us as we ask the important question: Who is He?

OUR CHURCH FINANCES

Our income for May is \$19,527.24 and to date totals \$113,533.64 or 41.60% of our annual budget. Our expenses total \$120,358.75 or 44.11% of our budget. Therefore, our net income for the first five months of the year is -\$6.825.11.

We have \$7,980.77 in our checking account at the end of May which includes \$4,116.20 in the Youth Fund and \$913.07 in the Baby Closet Fund.

Several pledges for the boiler and sign campaign have been signed and returned. In last month's newsletter I wrote about these two major expenses that we are facing as a congregation. First, a new sign was installed to help us better communicate with our neighborhood. The sign and city permit totaled \$4,650 and the expenditure was approved by the congregation in March.

Second, at our last business meeting we approved repairing the boilers in order to have heat in our church this winter. The repairs are scheduled late this summer. This gives us a few months to raise the necessary funds. McElroy Electric will do the repairs for \$42,915.

By the end of May we had \$1,015 for these two projects. As of the writing of this newsletter article our first two Sundays in June have added \$12,640.07 for a total of \$13,655 of our \$47,565 goal. **We have raised 29% of our goal!** Thank you!

If you did not get a pledge form last month or have misplaced your form, another copy is available on the table outside the church office. With prayerful consideration I ask you to complete the form and return it in the offering plate or to the church office along with your gift. The pledge can be made over a one, two or even three year period and should be in addition to your regular tithe. We don't plan to launch a full blown campaign like we have in the past but it is important for us to understand the critical nature of this effort.

MISSION - We have received \$530.00 for the **One Great Hour of Sharing** in June toward the coal of \$1,500.00. We will continue taking the One Great Hour of Sharing (OGHS) offering in July.

HABITAT FOR HUMANITY – The Congregation voted unanimously during its Quarterly Business Meeting on April 29th to partner with Habitat for Humanity in the "Build on Faith" project at 422 SW Taylor. A new Habitat house will be build by volunteers this summer. Speak with Don Johnson if you would like to volunteer at the work site. The Habitat for Humanity's director is currently working on the excavation and on some tree removal and coordinating with their plumber and concrete concrete contractor regarding the foundation work that should be starting soon! They are very close to being able to start setting the build schedule for volunteers.

Donation for "Habitat House" will be received.

DID YOU KNOW— In the last two years, the **Topeka Rescue Mission Ministries** division, now called Restore Hope, reached out in love, rescue and restoration to more than 130 victims of human trafficking who were residing in our own city. Unfortunately, we are confident this is just the begin-



ning of what lies ahead. According to statistics given by the Kansas attorney general's office, there were 44 identified cases of human trafficking in 2012 in the state of Kansas. In 2015, three short years later, there were more than 400. At the Topeka Rescue Mission, in spite of the enormity of suffering and injustice that we see every day, we still believe in miracles. However, after three decades in this ministry, I still find myself crying out to God and all too often in desperation asking Him, "God, why don't You do something?" Time and again, that still small voice of gentleness speaks back to me and says, "I am doing something, that's why I have sent you. Now go and do, be My hands, be My feet, be My voice." While I do not pretend to be an adequate representative of such an assignment, I realize I am not alone. He has surrounded me with an army of compassionate soldiers equipped by His love. His Spirit compels us to stand in the gap on behalf of those so wounded. Because of the nature of this ministry, you, our loyal and generous donors, volunteers and supporters won't see posts on Facebook or other detailed information being shared. Just know that we are hard at work to see women and children know that Jesus loves them and free from sexual slavery.


DAY 3—In small groups we talked about how Je-


