The holidays disrupt our routines and require us to pause (if we will) and consider how the Incarnation (God coming to dwell with us) is an interruption to the "normal" ways of human life.

One thing the past couple of years have taught me is: there is no normal. Every day is a new change (especially finding new grey hairs). We are forced to perpetually adapt to a "new normal." Age, health, kids/grandkids, school, politics, terrorism, the economy, etc. are all making enormous impacts upon us and our world. Yet, Paul wrote, "Jesus Christ is the same yesterday, today, and forever" (Hebrews 13:8). God is love, and that does not change! How does God's presence in Christ change us, if at all?




When the song of the angels is stilled, when the star in the sky is gone, when the kings and princes are home, when the shepherds are back with their flocks. the work of Christmas begins:

OUR CHURCH FINANCES - November 2019 Report

We are at 91.7 % of our budget year.

The income for November was

- \$21,902.15 and to date totals
 \$254,988.49 or 95.21% of the
 year. The total from the Wells Fargo investments
 this year is \$25,000. Out of this \$25,000 was
 \$11,050 budgeted interest and the remainder from
 principle. We also received this year \$7,885 from
 our Topeka Community Foundation investment.
 That payment was made in January. It is based
 on 5% of the 20-quarter rolling average of our
 investment from the Hill and Wooden estate gifts.
- Our expenses for November totaled \$19,275.28 and to date totals \$263,579.41 or 98.42%. The major reason the expenses are so great to date are the major building repairs that started last year. The new long-range capital campaign committee will be holding its first meeting after the first of the year to discuss plans for 2020 and beyond so we can handle future major repairs for our church facility.
- Our net income for the year is \$-7,629.58 compared to \$-11,107.74 last month. Our checking account at the end of November was \$10,313.02. This includes \$4,087.87 Youth Fund, \$1,000 Outreach grant, \$1,415.32 Baby Closet grant, \$3,775 Major Building Repairs gifts, \$500 WWW grant and \$100 Capital Funds Campaign.

The 2020 Proposed Budget was approved at the Sunday, December 8th breakfast meeting. A change was to add \$300 to the ABWM line making it \$500. This line item will now include the dues for ABWM as well as the annual offering.

24,000 Meals Per Month:

TRM Ministries Food Services is responsible for the planning, preparing and serving on average 24,000 meals per month in our dining room 7 days a week. The food served consists primarily of food donations from the community. Because of the generosity of the friends of TRM, this is accomplished for a cost of only 14 cents per meal.

Anyone who is hungry is welcome to eat at TRM.

Breakfast, lunch and dinner are provided Monday through Friday for free to anyone in need. Two meals are served on the weekends and holidays. There are no criteria to receive a meal from the Mission.

TRM Ministries relies on donations of food from individuals, churches, businesses and other partnering agencies to meet the daily food needs of our guests. Our most pressing food needs are updated monthly on our website. View the Monthly Needs List. Thank you for your support. Because of your generous and loyal support, and your donations of money, food and time, every \$5 donated serves a fresh meal to 35 people.
