





GETTING TO KNOW OUR CHURCH FRIENDS



Our Friends story this month features **Nancy Cottril.** Nancy has been a member of West Side Baptist since 1972. She has taught adult Sunday School class, was an American Baptist Women (ABW) officer, and sang in the choir for many years. Nancy shared that some of her happiest experiences with the church has been singing in the choir especially when Bruce Johnson directed and Don Manley played the organ. When Nancy moved to Topeka to be close to her sister and her sister's family, she knew that she would be going to West Side because Nancy's sister is Martha Beyer and Martha's husband, Doug, was the pastor of West Side.

Nancy was born in Palestine, Texas and by fifth grade her family moved to Cuero, Texas. Nancy has only one sister, Martha, who is four years older than Nancy. Their mother, Ruby, was a middle school teacher who taught English and Spelling. And, their dad, Phil, was a salesman of construction materials to build roads. Nancy had a strong Southern Baptist upbringing. She accepted Jesus as a young child and was baptized at First Baptist Church Palestine at a summer revival.

After high school graduation she attended Baylor University in Waco, Texas with intentions of becoming a teacher. After two years she got married and they moved to Fort Worth where she worked at the Army Depot. They had two children Mark and Melissa. Several years later she moved with her children to Tyler, Texas to study to be a dental hygienist. While going to classes, she worked at an employment agency in Tyler. She graduated from Dental Hygiene School in 1972.

Next was finding a job as a dental hygienist. Wanting her to move to Topeka, her sister, Martha, stepped in finding her a dentist who needed a hygienist. Nancy first worked with Dr. John McFarland for a year before going to work with Dr. Haler Kennedy for 20 years before retiring.

Nancy become a member of West Side Baptist as soon as she moved to Topeka but she learned about a new singles class starting up by Dr. Paul Eppinger at First Baptist. She decided to go on Thursday nights to the class and she quickly met and fell in love with Wayne Cottril. They met in February 1976, had their first date in April 1976 and were married on January 1, 1977. It was a marriage that was meant to be!

Wayne worked at Goodyear. They enjoyed traveling to all the state capitols of the U.S. by first camping in a small van but then buying a larger vehicle, a Dodge Caravan, when they planned to drive to Alaska. Their favorite places in the U.S. were Rocky Mountain National Park and the North Shore of Lake Superior. Wayne had no desire to travel overseas but he decided to grant a wish of Nancy's to spend two weeks in England, Belgium, Germany and Italy. And then he was hooked. They took a trip to Russia after Nancy was a volunteer for the Treasures of the Czar exhibit in Topeka. Then it was to Mexico and to South America to Chile, Argentina and Brazil. And we must not forget Australia and New Zealand.

I'm sure I've missed some of the countries she named. I asked if she ever went on a cruise and she answered saying when they first tried one to Key West and the Bahamas, the weather was so bad that it wasn't a good experience. But, they did take a cruise on the Inside Passage to Alaska which she enjoyed. One place Nancy didn't have a desire to go to was Africa. So, Wayne, the man who didn't want to travel, went with a small group on an African Safari. Nancy said this was his favorite trip but she doesn't think it was his favorite just because she didn't go with him.

Nancy and Wayne loved sports. First, their son Mark played football for Topeka High and their daughter Melissa was in the Topeka High Jazz Band. They attended all the games. Growing up in Texas, Nancy had always loved college football and growing up in Kansas, Wayne loved college basketball, so in 1983 when Mark started school at Washburn, they got season tickets for football and basketball. And slowly they started attending women's basketball at Washburn and becoming mentors to the out of-state women who didn't have families close. Juwanna Rivers was a point guard who the Cottril's started mentoring and ultimately became in a way "grandparents" to her. Juwanna played two years for Washburn and became ESPN's Player of the Game when Washburn won the 2015 National Championship Division II.

In 1998, they started also attending K-State games attending both the home and away games. They enjoyed seeing the stadiums and cities of all the Big 12 conference teams. After seven years they decided to quit going to all the K-State games because it became too much for them.

Nancy's daughter Melissa and husband Dennis have one daughter, Amanda. You occasionally see her with Nancy in church. They live close to Nancy.

In 2016, Nancy and Wayne celebrated 40 years of marriage with a big celebration at the Dillion House. Many West Side Baptist friends helped them celebrate. Wayne passed away on his birthday on August 17, 2022. Nancy stays active and still attends Washburn games and also enjoys our Pastor's Wednesday morning Bible Study.

I hope you're enjoying our newsletter articles on our church friends. If you would like to be featured, please let Nancy Lindberg know and she'll get you scheduled. At some point we hope to feature everyone!

Last month Jan and Tom Mansfield were featured along with Tom's mother Virginia. In reading it, you realized that part of the article was missing. You read about Jan and about Tom and Jan's life together but not about Tom. So, here is "the rest of the story".

Tom Mansfield was born in Elkhart, Indiana when his mom and dad were visiting family; but he was brought up in

Topeka. He first lived in our church neighborhood on Grove Street and would attend West Side Baptist. He remembers friends like Dick and Hazel May who encouraged him to attend and Tom wanted to be baptized. Tom had three siblings — Phil who was a year older, Jerry who is three years younger and a little sister Nancy who is six years younger. Phil is the only one who has passed away. Tom's dad was a preacher among other careers and his mom was a homemaker in the early years.

A 1965 graduate of Topeka High, Tom studied radio and TV repair. After graduating he decided to take an electrical apprentice with the International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers Local 226. But, before he completed the program, he was drafted to serve in the Army. He did basic training at Fort Leonard Wood Army Base, Missouri, and then to Fort Richie, west of Washington, D.C., and began work in communications. After serving, he returned to Topeka to complete his 4-year apprenticeship with the local union. It was then he met and married Jan. He said that "He couldn't do without her!" But after serving in the Army, Tom came back asking... "Is there a God?" and "Why are we here?" He found those answers by going to church and then being rebaptized at West Side Baptist.

Tom was a union man! He worked 44 years in the electrical trade. He had numerous projects across Topeka including Goodyear, St. Francis, and Seaman High School working with various companies, ie: Allied Electric and D.L. Smith. In fact, the last 15 years of his career were with D.L. Smith until his retirement in 2010.

Over the years Tom has had many positions in the church. Most recently he is serving on the *Fortifying Our Foundation for the Future Capital Campaign*. He has served on the properties committee for years doing all types of maintenance and as he stated, "I am the resident light bulb changer for West Side." He also was on a pastor search committee when Rev. Robert Austin, Jr. was called to serve.

Tom told me he can thank his granddad on his mom's side for his love for gardening and fishing which he still enjoys. He also crafts beautiful stained-glass windows. You can see one of his works of beauty which is the "May the Lord give you His peace" stained-glass window in the alcove next to the elevator made for Hilda Lundgren in memory of her husband, Orville.

TREASURER'S REPORT



Our income for August was \$33,641.23. The total to date for the year is \$185,262.53 and is 69.3% of our budget. 8/12 of the year is 66.67%. Income this month includes several tithes for the entire third quarter.

Our expenses for August were \$18,793.97 for total expenses from first of the year through

August of \$196,989.01. This is 71.69% of the budget. Expense items to note include: #6143 Conference Expense - \$300 was credited from ABC Annual Meeting; and #7140 Mission Education - \$200 was reimbursed for recent missionary visit.

The difference of income to expenses through August is -\$11,726.48.

Our checking account balance shown on the balance sheet is \$123,518.90 compared to \$115.000.11 last month. A large portion of our balance is in the Capital Campaign and Outreach funds.

The Benevolent Fund balance is \$6,291.96.

Please note memorial gifts for our three church members have been coming in. We have to date: \$3,180 for Harry Carpenter; \$1,860 for Trena Ansell and \$855 for Nadine Manley. The church has been notified that we are in Trena Ansell's estate.

The Council Members have been working on their budgets for 2024. If you have any budget recommendations, please talk with one of the council members and/or with me.

Since April 2023 the need for food assistance has drastically increased! Doorstep has already spent \$25,000 on food purchases this year to keep the pantry stocked and our neighbors fed. With the arrival of Fall, the staff and volunteers really ramp up our work on our annual Doorstep Christmas Adoption Project. We plan to adopt 260 households with 800+ individuals from the Christmas Bureau again this year. We are not going back to the Store type set-up we did for many years until the pandemic. However, our families will still receive

blankets, health kits, school supplies, toys for children, food for several days, a household item, gifts and \$20 gift cards for everyone in the household. The only new clothing items we will have are hoodies, socks, underwear, and children's winter pajamas. (Scarves, gloves & hats as we have them).

We are well stocked on school supplies this year; however, we have very little hygiene products to make health kits for the 260 households. We have these kits made up ahead of time and need to collect the following items in October:


