
2024 ABCCR ANNUAL GATHERING



GETTING TO KNOW OUR CHURCH FRIENDS

Our Friends story this month features Beverly McCurdy. Bev is active in our pastor's Wednesday morning Bible Study and has served as pulpit supply on Sunday mornings for our pastor when needed. She also taught Bible Study in the pastor's absence when he was in Africa. In 1992, Bev was ordained a full member and elder in the United Methodist Church. She loves mystery books, classic movies and family activities.

Bev was born in a suburb of Philadelphia and was the fourth daughter of John and Ruth Lankford. John was a machinist for a shipyard in Chester, Pennsylvania and Ruth was a homemaker. Bev's three sisters were 23, 21 and 16 years of age when she came along to join the family. The Lankford family were members of the Methodist Church until Bev was in 3rd grade when they decided to attend and join an American Baptist Church that was a growing church closer to their house. Bev was baptized at the age of 11 in this church. Her parents and all three of her sisters are now deceased.

During high school Bev enjoyed singing in the Acapella Choir and did some babysitting. After graduating she knew



The summer before starting at Alderson Broaddus University Bev worked as the assistant director of a Baptist camp in Massachusetts and it was there that Bev first met her husband-to-be Gil McCurdy. He was a few years older than Bev and was a serving as a pastor of a church on Cape Cod, MA. By coincidence (or was it a God thing) he was volunteering as a camp counselor.

Alderson Broaddus University had a placement program so after graduating with her bachelor's she received an appointment as Director of Christian Education for a church in Framingham, Massachusetts where she worked from 1964-1967.

Gil wanted to go into Clinical Pastoral Education so he left his church on Cape Cod to work at the Cushing Geriatrics Hospital in Framingham as their chaplain. He was also working on his Master's Degree in Sacred Theology at Andover Newton Seminary in Newton, MA.

In July 1964 when Bev was to be installed as pastor, Gil decided to go to the installation because others from the Baptist Association would be there. Afterwards Gil and Bev would see each other occasionally for coffee and finally had a first date planned to see the play Father Goose. But Gil had to break that date because his mom was sick but many dates later and over an 8-month courtship, they were married in October 1965. **Continued on page 9**

In 1967 when Bev was pregnant with their first child Anne, they moved to Western Pennsylvania to be near Gil's family. Over the next four years they pinched their pennies with Bev staying at home with their daughter. But in order to advance with his work, Gil interviewed for and was hired for a Veteran's Administration chaplaincy in Leavenworth, Kansas.

If you know Bev, you know that Bev is a Methodist Minister. So, do you wonder how/when she got involved in the Methodist Church? I was curious so in my interview I asked and she continued with their story which answered my question. Bev and Gil attended First Baptist Church in Leavenworth. Their son John was born in December 1972 and even though Bev wasn't working outside of the home, she did volunteer at the church. But, believing the Baptist church was too conservative, Bev decided to become a part time Christian educator at the Methodist Church in Leavenworth for five years and taught a Sunday School class for 9th graders with a friend. During that time, they took three short courses at St. Paul School of Theology, a United Methodist Seminary, in Independence, Missouri. Then Bev decided she wanted to go full time to seminary so at the age of 42, Bev attended the Seminary again and after 3 ½ years she received her Master's of Divinity in 1988.

Bev's first church was Trinity United Methodist Church in Leavenworth where she stayed for eight years. Gil retired from the VA so they left Leavenworth and she was then appointed by the church to serve in Westmoreland and Olsburg UMC churches for five years and Gil served as interim at the Onega Baptist Church. They moved to Topeka when Bev was appointed to serve two churches together, Kansas Avenue Methodist and Otterbein Methodist Churches. Then she retired. In retirement, they traveled and did some interim work. The Methodist District Superintendent asked her to go to Hoyt and she agreed to serve for six months which ended four years later. During that time Gil was asked by Roy Paslay, the ABCCR Executive Minister and a member of our church, to serve as interim pastor for West Side Baptist. This was after Wayne Mason and before Art Campbell. He served for 14 months. Gil died August 12, 2016. They had over 50 years of marriage. Bev told me, "I was fortunate to have this wonderful man in my life all these years. He always encouraged me in whatever I wanted to do, especially attending seminary."

Gil and Bev's daughter Anne with husband Paul live in Lecompton, KS. Anne has a degree from Baker and from Washburn. She currently is a bus driver for Topeka Metro. Paul is a retired auto mechanic. They have two boys, Jeffery who works for Helena Agra Enterprise and is a K-State grad and Steven who owns his own business, Kirk Excavating. Their son John lives in Michigan and teaches Early American History and Gender Studies at Eastern Michigan University. He has a PhD from Washington University in St. Louis. John just published his third book.

In closing, Bev asked me to mention two things: 1) In ministry, women have a real problem and are challenged hearing the call. She referenced 2 Timothy 2:11-13. 2) Church members struggle with women in the ministry and even if ordained it is difficult to have positions of consequence. She said, "My hope is that we support and encourage women who want to go into the ministry now and in the future."

TREASURER'S REPORT

Our Church Finances

Our income for July was \$16,565.78. At the end of seven months our income is \$198,681.83 or 74.06%. Our % goal for the first seven months is 58.3% of the annual budget so we are exceeding our goal. We received one of our two distributions from the Topeka Community Foundation in July. It was \$3,839.00 from the Portia and Vern Allbert Trust fund to be used for music related programs.

Our expenses for July totaled \$33,561.67 and a total for seven months of \$203,173.10 which is 68.33% of our budget. Major expenditure in line:



INCOME & EXPENSES

- #7710, Building Facility Maintenance, was to McElroy's payment of \$10,495 for the 2nd floor air conditioner with a second check to McElroy's for their \$1,176.40 service contract. We have spent our entire Building Maintenance Budget of \$14,000.00. We have paid \$27,306.68 in repairs through July, which does not include an additional \$20,000.00 in anticipated expense for other repairs.
- Other expenditures of interest for July included: #8155 Vacation Bible School \$194.35; #8415 Advertising \$292; #8430 Evangelism Program \$91.93.

We have exceeding our income for the month by -\$16,995.89 and for the year is -\$4,491.27.

Our checking account balance shown on the balance sheet is \$68,492.95. A portion of our checking account, \$45,922.54, is in the Capital Campaign and \$10,621.01 is in Outreach funds. The main general fund is \$9,364.90.

The Benevolent Fund balance is \$2,242.85. Praise the Lord for the generous giving to a family who needed rent assistance. We received \$1,770.00 in donations and matched your giving from the Benevolence Fund to meet the need. This has depleted our Benevolence Fund to lower than \$542.85.

We have received several gifts from the **Trena Ansell estate** over the last several months. The Council decided to add the majority of her gift to our Endeavor Investments. Earlier we received a gift which was added to the investment at the Topeka Community Foundation which provides annual distributions to our general fund. The first distribution of Trena's estate paid off her pledge to the general fund that she had made for 2023. Please feel free to talk with me anytime if you'd like information on how you can leave an estate gift to the church.

The Memorials Committee will be meeting this month to determine several distributions from memorials we have received in honor of those who have passed away. It's a wonderful way to purchase something needed for the church as we remember one of our loved ones.


